# REFLECTION AND STRATEGY

This year's annual report offers more insight and reflection into our year at GirlDreamer. With significant changes bringing significant learning, we want to create a deeper understanding of what those were and how they impacted us:



### Leadership Change

The temporary transition in leadership, with Amna embarking on a global scholarship, brought both challenges and opportunities. Kiran's leadership during this time exemplified resilience and adaptability and this period underscored the importance of having a strong, versatile team that can thrive even under unexpected circumstances. It also provided a chance for team members to step up, showcasing their leadership capabilities and contributing fresh perspectives to our mission.



# Organisational Sustainability

Securing core funding for three years has been a monumental achievement, ensuring financial stability and allowing us to focus on long-term goals rather than short-term exigencies. This stability enabled us to invest more in strategic planning, strengthen our governance with additions to our Board of Directors and the implementation of a new Advisory Board, reinforcing our commitment to young women of colour. We also used this period to establish stronger relationships with our funders and partners, ensuring a collaborative approach towards sustainability.



### Internal Development

A significant part of this year was dedicated to internal development. We focused on enhancing our organisational capabilities, streamlining processes, and investing in staff development. This internal fortification is crucial for our outward impact, ensuring that we operate efficiently and effectively. It also involved revisiting our strategic plan, integrating insights from Amna's global experience, and aligning our goals with the evolving needs of the communities we serve.



# GirlDreamer GOVERNANCE

As well as our core team and board of directors, we are also governed and shaped by our incredible advisory board.

Our board is composed of 12 young women of colour, who represent different backgrounds, professional industries and locations around the UK. They help to shape, inform and influence our community activities and general direction as an organisation to best reflect the community we serve.



### Zainab Al-Farabi

A British Arab woman, born to Iraqi/Iranian parents. Much to her brown parent's dismay, she ditched her corporate law career and moved into working in Diversity & Inclusion, following some of her experiences in the sector. It was one of the best moves I've made - I love championing and advocating for social justice issues and causes. I came across GirlDreamer during the height of the pandemic and it was just what I needed. I had never been surrounded by so many women of colour and felt like I was at home and at peace. I share my experiences as a brown woman often and when the advisory board opportunity came up, I knew I wanted in! My goal for my role is to support GirlDreamer in making its offerings accessible and inclusive as possible, to enable all women of colour an opportunity to thrive.



### **Jessie Auguste**

A software engineer passionate about addressing the digital divide, and empowering diverse people to engage with and build using technology. Firm believer in the power of community, love to contribute to spaces that empower women of colour to be their best selves. My goal at GirlDreamer is to use my tech passion and skills to support the organisation, and to develop my leadership skills whilst working with an incredible and passionate group of women

# OUR APPROACH



Life as a woman of colour in the UK has unique upsides as well as challenges. GirlDreamer understands this deeply, since our team exclusively comprises members of the very community we serve. Our mission is to improve the lives of women of colour by increasing their wellbeing and providing opportunities for them to realise their leadership qualities to their full potential.

Community is a fundamental part of what we do. Our togetherness is our strength, and we know that when women of colour come together, the whole is greater than the sum of the parts. Unfortunately, It is not uncommon for women of colour to feel alienated in their lives. Whether at school, at work, at home or in third spaces, many systems and structures are not built with women of colour in mind and at times can even purposely exclude them. GirlDreamer is an organisation that was founded to centre the voices of women of colour, and provide opportunities and spaces that prioritise their needs.

GirlDreamer focuses on two crucial aspects of life for our community: Wellbeing and Leadership.

Wellbeing prioritises the health and sense of self of our community members, at both the mental and the physical level. Psychological safety is a huge factor that influences why different people choose to engage with us. While we are well aware that women of colour are not a monolith, providing safe spaces for our community to get together to learn, share, eat and play is a key priority for us. It leads to a stronger sense of self, of belonging and allows space for healing.



Leadership is an important life skill that women of colour can use to create the positive change they wish to see in the world. We know that there is an abundance of leadership qualities in our community, with the plethora of businesses, side hustles, networks and events that we know of, and the many more that we don't. The missing piece is the access, the funding and the moral support to get women of colour led organisations off the ground and to scale their success.

In a world where your mere existence is challenged, GirlDreamer exists to champion women of colour and provide bespoke support to counter the status quo.

Our programmes and events prioritise wellbeing and leadership to provide support where it is most needed and foster community to fill the gaps left by the outside world. GirlDreamer strives to be a warm embrace for members of our community, providing a home away from home and introducing you to lifelong friends you haven't met before. Our mission is to ensure equity, access and joy for all our GirlDreamer community - past, present and future.





# IMPACT MEASUREMENT

Impact measurement is key to understanding the extent to which our programmes and initiatives are creating change. GirlDreamer has developed a framework to understand our key social impact goals and the metrics needed to measure progress against them.

Using the Theory of Change framework, GirlDreamer has identified seven core principles that underpin our social change work across all areas. These principles guide us to measure what really matters when investigating the impact that we have achieved.

GirlDreamer tracks impact by conducting post-intervention surveys and gathering feedback for each of the programmes and events that we hold. The questions we ask are guided by our core impact principles, with different programmes often targeting different impact goals. We also collect feedback on how to improve our programming and to better understand the needs of our community. These learnings will help to guide our decision making and programme schedule to ensure that GirlDreamer activities are beneficial to community members and reflect their changing needs and priorities, always.

# The Seven Principles of Impact for GirlDreamers:

- Awareness understanding of possibilities and opportunities that are available.
- Context understanding the context of challenges you may face and learning how to better move through the world as a WoC.
- Aspiration belief in your potential to achieve things beyond society's expectations.
- Agency belief that you have the power to make decisions that shape your future.
- Community connecting with likeminded people who share life experiences and can provide support.
- Action implementing these learnings by taking tangible steps to achieve specific personal and professional goals.
- **T**Leadership taking ownership of your community and creating new networks and organisations to serve the underserved.

The Dream Fund is a micro-funding initiative to support grassroots women of colour-led initiatives with small amounts of unrestricted funding to support their ventures. The Dream Fund supports organisations ranging from social businesses to community organisations, media projects and charities.

In 2023 we supported 20 organisations through the Dream Fund. We were able to

When asked about the biggest challenges facing their organisations, Dream Fund grantees most commonly mentioned the difficulty they faced in balancing their organisation alongside their other work commitments. This was closely followed by a lack of access to funding, and the sense of being overworked and under-resourced. These findings show that the Dream Fund programme contributes to some of the most significant challenges that women of colour entrepreneurs face.





# Biggest challenges facing Women of Colour led organisations in 2023



Dream Fund grantee organisations were able to use the funding to formalise and scale their organisations and activities. Funds were most commonly used to pay for additional resources for the organisations (59%). The majority of recipients stretched the funding received over three or more purposes. Funds were used to host events, establish online infrastructure, hire expert support, provide free services, build internal capacity and cover transport costs for beneficiaries.

# How funding has supported Dream Fund recipients





59% of Dream Fund recipients are currently actively applying for additional funding, and a further 18% have already secured additional funding. Those organisations in the 18% were able to gain a huge £54,000 in additional funding after receiving their Dream Fund grants. This shows that the benefits of being awarded the Dream Fund can stretch far beyond the programme itself.

Looking forward, 76% of Dream Fund grantees said they would benefit from access to a pool of specialised consultants that can support with specific organisations such as grant applications and marketing support upon request. Grantees also requested access to larger funding pots to support their organisations as they scale.

GirlDreamer has secured new partnerships that will allow for greater funds to be distributed, and is developing a broader programme to support grantees with their business needs over 2024.

### **LinkedIn Speed Mentoring**

In March, GirlDreamer partnered with LinkedIn to create an event in celebration of International Women's Day. Ten GirlDreamers were invited to the LinkedIn offices in London to take part in a unique speed-mentoring programme to further their professional development. Each mentee was able to speak to three experts from LinkedIn, covering topics such as breaking into new industries, personal branding, and how to get the most out of the LinkedIn platform. Each mentee was also given free access to LinkedIn Premium for six months, helping them to elevate their profiles and progress their job hunt using new tools and features on LinkedIn.

GirlDreamer also engaged a photographer who took formal headshots for each mentee to use on their professional profiles.

86% of participants reported that taking part in this event inspired them to take steps towards achieving their goals. Some examples of these goals include actively pursuing aspirational career paths, attending more networking opportunities, and embracing a growth mindset whilst job hunting. 100% of participants reported keeping in touch with someone they met at this event.

### So, You Want To... Start a Social **Business?**

100% of participants agreed that taking part in this event had inspired them to take steps towards achieving their goals

67% of participants feel more confident in their ability to apply for relevant opportunities after this event



It was great to hear from people at different stages about practical steps and actions to take.

This year, GirlDreamer partnered with Hatch Enterprise to host an online panel discussion to encourage social entrepreneurship. The event, titled "So, You Want To... Start a Social Business?" featured four outstanding women of colour entrepreneurs who shared insights about their experiences in establishing their own organisations.

The purpose of the event was to help attendees understand more about what's involved in establishing and running a social business. The session also served as an opportunity to promote the next round of the Dream Fund, as well as to signpost to services offered by Hatch Enterprise and similar services.

The speaker panel was particularly inspirational because it featured alumni of both the Dream Fund and Hatch Enterprise, showcasing how being part of these networks can support growth and business success. 110 people signed up to the event and over half attended the panel live, asking insightful questions and gaining inspiration for their own initiatives. The focus on social entrepreneurship was important to participants, evidenced by feedback praising the selection of speakers. Attendees left the event with a better understanding of the steps they need to take to build or grow their ideas and inspired to take action to achieve their goals.

### **Cairngorms Retreat**

"

This was the most wholesome week I've experienced in a long time. A real sense of community, understanding and friendship is what I now walk away with. The vulnerability and openness the group shared within hours of meeting each other is unheard of.

GirlDreamer partnered with Backbone CIC to provide a unique retreat experience in the Scottish Highlands. Ten GirlDreamers were given the opportunity to explore and learn about the Cairngorms National Park, enabling them to connect with nature, learn safety techniques and develop their leadership skills. We believe that it is important for our community, many of whom live in large metropolitan areas, to access opportunities to experience the great outdoors and connect with themselves in beautiful and peaceful settings.

This retreat provided a safe space for young women of colour to experience domestic travel destinations and learn more about the natural environment in the UK.



(My highlight was the) connection I felt in emotional, mental, physical and spiritual ways with both nature and the incredible women I was with.

100% of survey respondents reported that this retreat was the first time they had visited the Cairngorms National Park in Scotland. 75% of respondents strongly agreed that they felt a greater sense of appreciation for nature and the outdoors as a result of this experience. Most of the participants strongly agreed that the residential felt like the break they needed from daily life. All respondents maintained connections with someone they met on the retreat, and 100% strongly agreed that they would recommend the retreat to a friend.

### **GirlDreamer Supper Club**

GirlDreamer launched a new Supper Club to platform incredible women of colour chefs whilst providing opportunities to connect with likeminded people. The event series was designed exclusively for members of the GirlDreamer community to create more in-person connections and foster the community spirit within our network. The Supper Club is rotational, meaning that each event is hosted in a different venue in cities with a strong GirlDreamer presence. The idea is to provide a range of experiences for GirlDreamers, catering to different budgets and preferences and accessible to people living in different parts of the UK. Our vision is to support amazing Women of Colour chefs and restaurateurs across the country, whilst providing a welcoming space for GirlDreamers to come together.

Our events have been catered by the likes of Asma Khan, owner of Darjeeling Express and named the "Coolest Person in Food and Drink in 2019" by Business Insider. We have also dined at Sabrina Fung's Blow Water Cafe, which had previously been supported by GirlDreamer during its fundraising campaign.

A key part of our work is bridging the gap between access and opportunity.

Our way of doing this is through our Opportunities service. Here, we advertise a range of opportunities including job opportunities, events, scholarships and trusteeships as well as internal GirlDreamer programme opportunities.

In 2023 we shared 116 opportunities on our Opps page, securing partnerships with a range of organisations to help them to broaden their outreach. We partnered with 33 organisations including Trustees Unlimited, which shared a wide range of opportunities from their extensive partner network through our Opps service.

This year marked a significant milestone for our Dream Fund. Since its inception in 2020, our commitment to its growth has been unwavering, with each passing year witnessing a doubling of its impact.

In 2023, we are delighted to announce a significant investment from The Alliance for Gender Equality in Europe, marking our first international partnership and a substantial step towards achieving our goals.

We were awarded £100,000, which we will directly allocate through our Dream Fund, enabling us to support an additional 50 women of colour-led start-ups and small charities.

Furthermore, we secured extended support from the Paul Hamlyn Foundation for a two-year period. This additional support will bolster our organisational capacity, allowing us to effectively execute our new strategic direction for the years 2023 to 2025.

We continue to benefit from three years of core funding, which began in 2022, and we are actively utilising this crucial support to maintain our team, infrastructure, and ongoing initiatives.

As is tradition, we express our profound gratitude to our dedicated funders for their continued belief in our vision and steadfast support. Together, we are working diligently to create a more equitable society where young women of colour can thrive.
